What is civil conversation? At its simplest, a civil conversation is a dialogue between 2 people or a group that intends to build a better understanding. Participants do not have to agree – what matters is the act of listening to other people and learning their perspective. The point is to raise important questions and (hopefully) hear one another's point of view.

In an increasingly divisive society, what would it be like to hold civil conversations in our own families and communities? How can we create space for people to come together and have these conversations? Join our dynamic and informative conversation hosts to learn skills for having respectful conversations that clarify differences, search for common ground, and affirm the importance of relationships. Learn how to be aware of you own "inner-polarizers."

The Responsible Use of Technology and Social Media: Digital Citizenship – Dr. Susan Balter-Reitz, Professor, MSU-Billings Department of Communication and Theatre, and radio host



Dr. Sue Balter-Reitz (Rights) has an MA in Persuasion from the University of Wyoming and a PhD in Rhetoric and Law from the University of Washington. She has been teaching at MSU-Billings since 2002 and is currently Director of e-Learning. During the day, she masquerades as a mild-mannered Legal Argument scholar (for which she was named the 2015 recipient of the Franklin Haiman award for outstanding research in Freedom of Expression), but on weekends she metamorphoses into a Grateful Dead scholar and is the host for Dead of the Night on Yellowstone Public Radio.

Positive Conversations and Projects with Indigenous People – Jean Bearcrane, Executive Director, Montana Native Women's Coalition



Jean Bearcrane is an attorney, a member of the Crow Tribe and the current executive director of the Montana Native Coalition. She began practicing law in 1984 after graduating from Marquette University Law School. Jean's clients have been primarily federally-recognized Indian tribes. She has also taken on additional roles besides attorney, including teaching at Montana State University-Billings, conference speaker, trainer, and mentor for students and new law school graduates. However, her most cherished role is mom, grandmother, and great-grandmother to her children, nieces, nephews and their children.

Using Civil Language in Legal Settings – Honorable Colette Davies, District Court Judge, Montana 13th Judicial District



Judge Colette Davies is a Montana District Court Judge, serving in the Montana 13th Judicial District, Yellowstone County. She has been a member of the State Bar of Montana since 1997, and is admitted to practice in Montana, including the Montana Federal District Court, as well as the Ninth and Tenth Circuit Courts of Appeal. From 2005 through 2010, Colette served as an appointed judge for the City of Billings Municipal Court, one of the highest-volume courts in the state of Montana, where she worked closely with therapeutic treatment courts, including drug court and mental health court.

Colette is married to Bill Davies. They are the proud parents of Jack and Chloe.

Keeping Women Relevant in Media Conversations – Nadya Faulx, News Director, Yellowstone Public Radio



Nadya Faulx joined Yellowstone Public Radio as news director in October 2021.
